Clinical evaluation Symptoms of trigeminal neuralgia are almost pathognomonic. Thus, some other disorders that cause facial pain can be differentiated clinically: Chronic paroxysmal hemicrania (Sjaastad syndrome) is differentiated by longer (5 to 8 min) attacks of pain and its dramatic response to indomethacin.
