Overview A growing body of evidence indicates that access to safe drinking-water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) services has an important positive impact on nutrition. Achieving the six Global Nutrition Targets 2025, as well as global goals for WASH and health, will require greater investments in nutrition and WASH.

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Improving nutrition outcomes with better water, sanitation ...

Nutrition and Water, Sanitation and Hygiene. Proper sanitation and hygiene and safe drinking water can reduce undernutrition and stunting in children by preventing diarrhoeal and parasitic diseases, and damage to intestinal development (environmental enteropathy). According to the World Health Organization, roughly 50% of all malnutrition is associated with repeated diarrhoea or intestinal worm infections as a direct result of inadequate water, sanitation and hygiene.

Almost 1 billion people lack access to safe drinking water. More than 2.3 billion people lack access to safe sanitation. And 892 million people practice open defecation, meaning they have no sanitation facilities at all. Improving nutrition requires far more than improving the quality and quantity of food.

IMPROVING NUTRITION OUTCOMES WITH BETTER WATER, SANITATION ...

Universal access to safe drinking water and adequate sanitation and hygiene would reduce the global disease burden by 10%. (WHO 2012) In urban areas, for every \$1 invested in basic drinking water, an average of more than \$3 is returned in saved medical costs and increased productivity.

The provision of safe water, sanitation and hygiene is essential to protecting human health during all infectious disease outbreaks, including the COVID-19 outbreak. Consistently applied WASH and waste management practices in communities, homes, schools, marketplaces, prisons and health care facilities will further help to prevent transmission of the COVID-19 virus.

Improving access to safe water and sanitation facilities leads to healthier families and communities. However, when people are also motivated to practice good hygiene – especially hand-washing with soap – health benefits are significantly increased.

Formerly known as Integrated Nutrition and Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Activity (INWA), Gikuriro aims to improve the nutritional status of women of reproductive age and children under five years of ages with an emphasis on the 1,000 days window of opportunity from pregnancy until the child's second birthday.

The World Health Organization estimates that 50 percent of malnutrition is associated with repeated diarrhea or intestinal worm infections from unsafe water or poor sanitation or hygiene.² Stunting can stem from enteropathy, a chronic illness caused by inflammation that keeps the body from absorbing calories and nutrients.

Cambodia Integrated Nutrition, Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (NOURISH) One out of three (32.4%) children under the age of five in Cambodia are stunted. The prevalence of stunting is 10% higher among children born to mothers from the lowest wealth quintile (42%).

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
